
Wild and Scenic Rivers are:

- Designated by Congress or Secretary of the Interior
- Administered by a federal or state agency
- Boundaries are generally ¼ mile on either bank to protect river related values
- Designation does not have to include the entire river



Rivers are classified as

- Wild-free of impoundments and generally inaccessible except by trail, with watersheds or shorelines essentially primitive and waters unpolluted.
- <u>Scenic</u>- free of impoundments, with shorelines or watersheds still largely primitive and shorelines largely undeveloped, but accessible in places by roads.
- Recreational- readily accessible by road or railroad, may have some development along their shorelines, and may have undergone some impoundment or diversion in the past.





Scenic Area Act

- SEC. 13 Tributary Rivers and Streams (c) Wild and Scenic River Designations
- <u>Klickitat</u> from Wheeler Creek to the Columbia <u>Recreation</u>
- White Salmon from Gilmer Creek to Buck Creek - <u>Scenic</u>

Designation does not

- Prohibit development
- Give Federal government control over private property

Uses such as

• Recreation, agricultural practices, residential development, and others may continue

River protection is

- Voluntary through landowners and river users, and
- through regulations and programs of federal, state, local and tribal government

The Act limits

how much land the federal government is allowed to acquire from willing sellers (100 acre per river mile- White Salmon Management Plan asks for a congressional exception of 150 acre)

Lower White Salmon Wild and Scenic River Management Plan

- The Wild and Scenic Rivers Act provides overall legal authority and requirements for planning and management of W&S Rivers.
- Overall management goal is to meet the intent of the W&SR Act by:
 - maintaining the current character of the river area and,
 - •providing long term protection and enhancement of its outstandingly remarkable values.

Public input to plan: 136 written responses

Desired Condition of the Five Management Areas

1. White Salmon River Channel: OHW

- Water quantity, throughout the year, is the same as when designated
- Water quality is as high as measured in 1991
- · River remains free flowing
- Pump houses, spring boxes, etc are relatively inconspicuous to boaters
- · Absence of litter in river and on banks
- Historic river related structures remain in place
- Fish habitat in good condition
- Increase in large woody material from 1991- not where boating safety is compromised
- · Everyone has equal opportunity to float river
- Boaters respect the rights of private landowners



2. The Buffer:

200' each side outside rural centers
100' each side in Husum
20' beyond gorge rim in BZ, not exceeding 200' wide

- Vegetation is generally undisturbed and made up of native species
- Vegetation is
 - late successional or becoming so
 - is dense enough to screen development outside buffer
 - Used as a wildlife corridor outside rural center



3. Federal Lands Outside the Buffer

- Oregon white oak are abundant and healthy
- Some conifer manipulation occurs to maintain existing oak stands
- Wetlands and riparian area function effectively
- A few short interpretive trails are located in the area, but not near the river
- · A few roads are are still in existence
- · Few or no cattle graze in the area.

4. Private Lands Outside the Buffer and Rural Centers of BZ and Husum

- Landscape is a mixture of agricultural fields, orchards, small woodlots and farm and rural residences, with fields and wood- lots predominating
- Active production of agriculture products continues
- · Occasional harvest of small stands of timber
- Residence increase somewhat from 1991 levels and are located on land which is least suitable for agriculture production and forest management.
- Development activities new since 1991 are not visible from the river
- There may be a few new uses which promote, or are compatible with farm and forest operation, but other types of uses are absent

5. Private Lands Outside the Buffer but Inside Rural Centers of Husum and BZ

- Small, spacious, attractive rural communities of
 - residences
 - small businesses
 - commercial services that fit into and serve the surrounding forest and farm patterns
- No land use or traffic conflicts
- Absence of large industrial or commercial facilities that
 - don't fit the area or
 - adversely impact river values (especially water quality)
- Adequate community water and sewer systems
- · Buildings visible from river are not visually dominate
- Portions of the rural center adjacent to the Buffer are community parks



FS Management Actions

- One full time staff W&S River manager and a summer River ranger
- Review and comment on proposed county permits inside W&S river corridor
- Work with realtors/landowners selling parcels in the corridor
- Work with others such as Underwood Conservation District, Washington Department of Ecology and River Keepers to monitor water quality
- Conduct surveys on social and physical carrying capacity
- Work with outfitters to educate public about river ecosystems, etiquette, history and the rivers outstandingly remarkable values
- Work with Klickitat County, Federal Highways and WA State Parks on recreation projects
